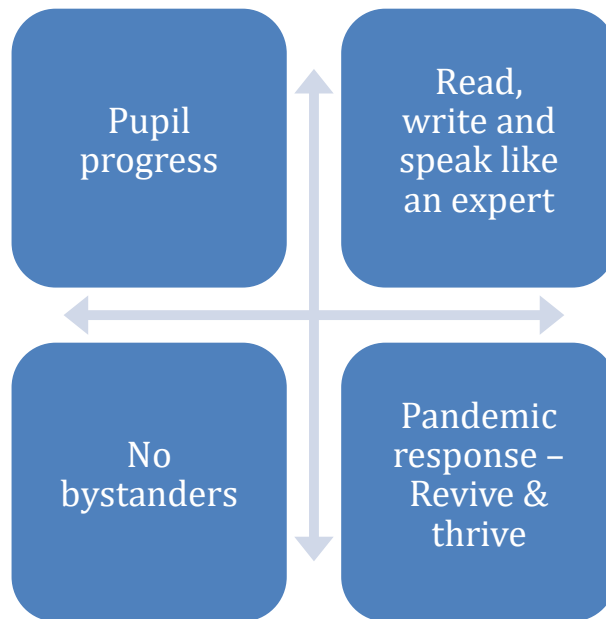
We believe in:

Pandemic response: Revive and thrive

- Effective systems of control: review controls and zones regularly; safeguard pupils and staff as we lead high-quality teaching and activities
- Identify and support pupils with particular pastoral needs following school closure
- Every department to agree priorities in response to lost learning and/or exam changes
- Remote teaching: Train new pupils and staff in Teams; continue refresher training and updates; establish effective plans for possible school partial closure or rotas

Pupil progress

- GCSE progress: Achieve Sig+ P8 overall and in each area of the new Progress 8. Our benchmark of excellence is 70% grades 7 to 9, with no grades below a 5.
- A-level: Achieve upper quartile ALPS results in all subjects. Our benchmark of excellence is >20% A* grades and >50% A*/A overall.
- Make full use of data (e.g. baseline tests, grades, targets, CPOMs) to highlight groups and individuals for particular support and challenge

Challenging prejudice

- Highlight racism as a safeguarding issue, ensuring that all staff know how to respond to incidents and disclosures
- Establish diversity and equality groups that will make a positive impact on the culture of the school; promote role models from underrepresented groups
- Analyse academic and pastoral measures by ethnicity as for other groups (e.g. pupil premium, boarding, gender) in order to respond to patterns or concerns

- Review and make changes in our curriculum to ensure that BAME perspectives flourish

Love of reading – improving writing

- All pupils from Year 7 to 11 to bring a reading book to school each day, with reading in form time a normal part of LRGS culture
- Create multiple opportunities and events to promote a love of reading and writing
- Build on training from 2019-20 to ensure that every subject promotes the whole school literacy strategy – developing excellent reading and writing throughout the curriculum

SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The school operates a timetable with a two week cycle of 70 periods per fortnight. Each period lasts for 40 or 45 minutes. The period allocation for the timetable is shown in the diagram on the following page. Non-examined elements of the school's broad and balanced curriculum include timetabled form periods and games lessons for all students, PE and a Values Course for all years 7-11.

Options:

Year 7:

Pupils study French, German and Spanish on a language carousel.

Year 8:

Pupils choose to study 2 MFL's

Year 9:

Pupils choose to either continue with their two MFL's or replace one with Ancient Greek. In addition they can choose whether to continue with either Latin or Technology.

Year 10 & 11:

All students study English, English Literature, and Maths to GCSE.

They choose *seven* optional GCSE subjects including at least one modern or classical language and at least two sciences from: Latin, Greek, French, Spanish, German, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Art, Photography, Music, Physical Education, Theatre Studies, History, Geography, Religious Studies, Resistant Materials, Food Technology and Computing.

SIXTH FORM

Most students opt for three A-levels or Cambridge Pre-U subjects but four are available for those who are able to cope.

All Sixth Form students have form time with their tutor each morning, and an additional timetabled form period each week. Games lessons are another compulsory timetabled element of the Sixth Form timetable. Students may also be timetabled for additional supervised study or support in the Sixth Form centre.

A growing number of students also study for the Extended Project Qualification. This is a research-based qualification in a topic of their choice with a subject mentor.

Additionally, we look for our 6th formers to involve themselves in many other ways in the school and beyond including mentoring, volunteering, assisting in classrooms, helping our InspirUS Project,

Examinations Policy

The policy of the School is to enter all pupils for external examinations as follows:-

GCSE

A maximum of 10 subjects (3 core + 7 options) are taken by all pupils at age 16 (Year 11). Included in the 10 subjects are English Language and English Literature.

A-level and Pre-U

Pupils will take up to 4 subjects at A-level or Pre-U with most choosing to study 3.
