Students will be issued with a log book in October of the Lower Sixth and our expectation is that all Lower Sixth students will engage with the Praesis ut Prosis Award. Through involvement with this award, students will develop their leadership skills, independence and key transferable, employability skills such as

- communication
- collaboration
- interpersonal skills
- time management
- problem solving
- decision making
- creativity
- reflection
- community and global awareness

Activities and hours should be logged and signed by the activity leader (eg. employer / supervising teacher) and then countersigned by the form teacher, Mrs Hope or member of the Sixth Form team. It is the student's responsibility to reflect on the specific skills developed and to collate relevant and clear evidence in order to achieve the Bronze, Silver or Gold award.

Log books should be submitted in the September of the Upper Sixth in order to be verified and certificated by the Sixth Form team in October.

Evidence accepted

- Confirmation on letter-headed paper from employer / organisation or email from the organisation's official email address, alongside reflections logged by the student in the log book.
- Teacher signatures for lunchtime and evening talk / clubs / societies etc
- Reflective comments on activities undertaken.
